13890 Canadice-2 year

Early ripening red seedless grape derived from Himrod. Extremely winter hardy. First choice seedless grape for cold winter climates. 100hours. Self-fruitful.

13895 Concord, Eastern-2 year

V. labrusca hybrid. Standard of quality for bluish black grapes. Large, well filled clusters of glossy, medium size, round, slipskin, bluish black berries overspread with bloom. Excellent, distinctive flavor that virtually identifies bottled U.S. grape juice. Used for table juice, jelly and wine. Vigorous, hardy, strong growing, productive vine. Self-fruitful. Ripens in late September.

28242 Himrod-2 year

Seedless. Large, long, loose clusters. Medium size, oval, seedless golden yellow fruit. Crisp but tender skin. Sweet, delicious, juicy flesh. Fine quality table variety. Pure, sweet juice of delicate flavor. Makes excellent raisins. Self fruitful.

33378-Glenora – 2 year

Seedless. Medium to large, loose, heavy, well filled clusters. Bluish black grape. Thin, smooth skin. Sweet, spicy, fine textured, highly flavored flesh. Superior quality. Keeps well on the vine. Mildew resistant. High vigor. Ripens before Concord in late August early September.

28242-Price – 2 year

Relatively small, compact clusters; many clusters to the vine. Medium size, bluish black fruit. Flavor is sweet and pure, lacking any of the American foxiness. Good quality. Very good as a table and juice grape. One of the best varieties for extra cool areas of the Pacific Northwest, because of its ability to ripen early, even in cool weather.

100794 Nova

Large, sweet blue fruit. Ripens evenly and a bit earlier than York. Pollinate with York.

100797 York

Juicy, sweet, purplish black berries. Large creamy white flowers in spring. Pollinate with Nova

Gooseberries & Currants \$5.99 ea

84771 Crandall Black Currant

Large black currants in clusters. Sweet-tart flavor. Excellent for jam, syrup and juice. Five times the vitamin C of oranges. Bush is upright, fast growing, and has dark green leaves. Very productive. Ornamental yellow flowers with delightful fragrance lasting for up to two weeks in the spring. Ripens in mid-July

84765 Cherry Red Currant

Produces clusters of white, translucent fruit with a pink blush. This is considered to have the sweetest and richest flavor of all currants and is about the same in size as red currants and also as hardy. The White Imperial is an old variety that was introduced in 1895. Early ripening berry.

23174 Primus White Currant

Compact bushes bear long fruiting clusters; 20 pounds per bush. Very high vitamin C content. Flavor is the sweetest of the currants. Self pollinating.

23172 Red Lake

Compact clusters are medium to large with 8-10 berries. Long stems for easy picking. Large, dark red berries. Excellent for jellies, preserves, tarts and muffins; makes sparkling red jelly. Strong, vigorous, upright bush with dense foliage. 4-6ft tall and 2-5ft. wide. Early bearing, produces fruit on two year and older wood. Long ripening season, holds well on the bushes. Excellent bird forage and windbreak plant.

33380 Welcome Gooseberry

Medium to large, light green fruits with few spines turn pinkish red when fully ripe. Rich, juicy, pink flesh; sweet tart flavor. Makes delicious red pies, jellies or jams. Extremely productive. Practically thorn less. Bears over a long season from late June until late July.

Blackberries

13725-Boysenberry \$5.29 each

Very large, non-shiny, dark maroon berries. Soft, very juicy flesh. The Boysen has a distinctive, rich, tangy flavor and very aromatic. Excellent for eating fresh, juice, freezing, canning, pastries,

and preserves. Ripens about July 1, and are among the largest of the small fruits. Vigorous, trailing vines. Boysenberries are hardy to approximately -10 degrees F. without protection. Hardy in zones 5-9.

13730-Boysen, Thornless \$5.29

Enjoy the large, sweet, juicy berries for two months as they keep ripening. The large reddish black fruit is up to two inches long. It is sweet and aromatic. Try eating them fresh with cream. They are delicious. The vine is trailing and vigorous.

13705-Logenberry, Thornless \$5.49

Hybrid between a blackberry and a raspberry with large, tart, dull-red fruit. It was developed in 1881 by US judge James H Logan.

13715-Marion \$5.29

A thorny and consistently heavy July bearing, high quality favorite. Many people prefer the rich flavor of Marionberries to any others for fresh eating or making the finest pies, jellies or juices.

22806- Triple Crown \$5.29

Triple Crown Blackberry is the newest thorn less blackberry. This blackberry is named for its three crowning attributes: flavor - productivity - vigor The Triple Crown Blackberry ripens from about July 10 to about August 10. This blackberry variety yield large, glossy black fruits that are pleasantly firm and have the capacity to produce larger berries than any other variety we have seen.

Raspberries

84723 Boyne \$3.19

Medium size, tender, juicy, dark red berries; aromatic, medium sweet and very good quality. Excellent for jam, jelly, and freezing. Very productive, heavy, strong, sturdy, summerbearing. Great for the home garden.

28222- Caroline \$3.50

Everbearing. Large, firm and cohesive fruit. Unique flavor with a special tangy twist. Long fruiting period. Shows good tolerance to root rot.

84735 Fall Gold \$3.19

This very vigorous gold raspberry is a beautiful hybrid that originated in Korea and is cold hardy. The large tasty berries are sweet as honey and are terrific for eating fresh off the bush or cooking. This raspberry is also popular to use as a garnish in restaurant desserts. The first crop matures in July and the second in September. Zones 5-8

84732 Heritage \$3.19

Introduced from New York State at Geneva in 1969. Large, sweet, dark red berries with a mild flavor. This superior quality berry is good for fresh eating, freezing, canning, and preserves. The canes are tall for an everbearing raspberry, but are very sturdy and seldom require support. Strong, vigorous, very productive, suckers prolifically and spreads rapidly. Fairly tolerant of heavier soils but will develop Root Rot in poorly drained areas. Moderate summer crop with heavier, superior fall crop. An excellent variety for the home gardener and also grown commercially in many areas.

83160 Indian Summer \$2.49

Everbearing. Large clusters of large, conic, glossy, high quality, aromatic, unusually sweet, bright red berries. Good for fresh eating, quick freezing and canning; makes a tasty jam. One of the earliest everbearers to ripen.

99279 Tulameen \$3.19

This British Columbia variety produces exceptionally large light red aromatic fruit that has a fine flavor. The fruit is 25% bigger than Meeker. Tulameen is also unique in that it extends the summer raspberry season through July and August. It produces for up to 50 days. It is a great find for backyard growers.

84720 Willamette \$3.19

Large to very large, long-conic, very firm, deep red fruit. Lower sugar content; rich, slightly tart flavor. Outstanding quality for table, canning or freezing. Tall, vigorous canes bear heavily. Disease resistant. Needs well drained soil.

Blackcap Raspberries \$6.29

100800 Munger

Although developed in the Eastern U.S., Munger has become the most widely produced variety in the Pacific Northwest accounting for almost all of the commercially frozen black raspberries processed today. Perhaps because it appears to show greater natural resistance to fungal diseases than other black raspberry varieties. Munger ripens mid season and has firm, shiny, average sized fruit

Albion

Everbearing This variety produces smaller amounts consistently throughout the production season. Albion has shown resistance to Verticillium wilt (*Verticillium dahliae*) and Phytophthora crown rot (*Phytophthora cactorum*). The fruit has outstanding flavor and attractive internal and external fruit color. This is a fairly new variety that has done well in both California and Colorado.

Benton (June Bearing)

The easiest to grow of the June strawberries. The large, uniform, bright red fruit is very flavorful. It is great eaten fresh and makes a good freezer berry. It tolerates wetter soils and disease problems. It ripens later in June than most varieties.

Earliglow

Junebearing. Medium to large, symmetrical, conic fruit. Tough, glossy, deep red skin. Firm, uniformly deep red flesh. Exceptional flavor. Vigorous, productive plants: many runners. Resistant to botrytis, root rot, verticillium wilt, leaf scorch and leaf blight.

Fern (Day Neutral)

Very high yields on a variety that continues to produce during all stages of growth. Large, firm, very sweet berries. Good for fresh, eating, preserves & freezing.

Quinalt

Everbearing. One of the largest strawberries, often as big as teacups. Firm and deep red; tasty. Good for desserts, preserves and eating fresh. Not for freezing. Vigorous plants produce many runners. High yielding. Resistant to disease. Cold hardy

Rainier

June Bearing. High quality, large bright red fruit. Wedge conic shape. Fine flavor. Good for freezing and fresh. Virus tolerant.

Seascape (Day Neutral)

The Seascape originated as a cross between Selva and Douglas. Seascape plants have a lower chilling requirement than Selva and are more vigorous. Highly tolerant of the virus diseases common in California, moderately susceptible to Leaf Spot. Fruit is symmetrically medium to long conic. Color is redder than Selva inside and out, with an attractive glossy finish. Noteworthy for high flavor, high yield, large fruit size, firmness, symmetry, attractive appearance and general flexibility in planting requirements.

Sequoia (June Bearing)

Very large, dark red berries, good flavor. Fair to good quality for dessert / freezing. It is actually an extremely long season Spring Crop when grown as far North as Oregon. In areas safe from early frost, Sequoia is the earliest Spring Crop on the market and it keeps bearing fruit several weeks after the typical Spring Crop is gone. Hardy in zones 6-9.

Tri Star (Everbearing)

Sweet and aromatic. Produces a heavy, very early spring crop of small to medium short conic fruit. Cool fall weather will bring larger, more elongated fruit. Fall crop is the heaviest. Berries have firm, glossy, deep red skin with solid, medium red flesh. Excellent Flavor. Also recommended for freezing. Medium size plants, moderate number of runners which will bloom and bear fruit before rooted. Good for hanging baskets. Resistant to Red Stele and Verticillium Wilt. Tolerant of Leaf Scorch and Leaf Blight. Well adapted to the Pacific Northwest.

Asparagus

84711 Jersey Knight \$.89 each

Male hybrids with fewer female seed plants than are found in open pollinated varieties. These varieties are high yielding, have excellent fusarium tolerance and high resistance to rust. They have a large attractive spear. Due to greater disease resistance and less expenditure of photosynthate forming seed, live longer than male - female varieties.

84714 Sweet Purple \$.89 each

This new type of asparagus has many similar characteristics to green asparagus but offers something new for the asparagus connoisseur. The spears produced have several qualities which make it quite different from common green asparagus.

1. The deep-burgundy coloration produced in these spears is the most striking difference between the purple and green varieties.
2. This type has a 20% higher sugar content. Because of this extra sweetness, this vegetable is often eaten raw. Some upscale restaurants garnish salads with purple asparagus. When cooked, the sweetness gives this asparagus a mild, nutty flavor.
3. The spears are generally larger and much more tender than its green counterpart. The vascular bundles have less lignin per spear which make the spears less stringy. This allows the cook to use the entire spear with little waste.

An all male variety with smaller spears than the Jersey Knight.

84795 Nugget

Nugget is a bittering-type cultivar, bred in 1970. The lineage of Nugget is 5/8 Brewers Gold, 1/8 Early Green, 1/16 Canterbury Golding, 1/32 Bavarian and 5/32 unknown. Tolerant to downy mildew, and powdery mildew. Pickability of a medium-size, compact cone. Used for its bittering potential plus aromatic properties similar to Northern Brewer.

84789 Crimson Cherry \$5.49 (jumbo roots)

Also known as *Crimson Red*, *Crimson Wine*, *Crimson*. This is reportedly the only variety of consequence in Oregon. It produces brightly colored Red stalks with the unique characteristic of being Red throughout under normal temperature and moisture conditions of the Pacific Northwest.

84786 Strawberry (Victoria) \$2.79

Pink petioles, Red petioles, medium to heavy seed stalk production, Large sticks with both interior and exterior rose color, very similar to Victoria and may be the same variety, Pink stalks.
